

Illinois Fentanyl Education Bill

In July 2023, the Illinois legislature enacted <u>House Bill 3924</u> to raise awareness about the dangers of fentanyl as a lethal drug. Starting from the 2024-2025 school year, it is mandated that in every state-required health course for grades 9 through 12, a school district should offer instruction, study, and discussion on the dangers of fentanyl. The legislation outlines specific requirements for the instruction, study, and discussion, and mandates that students be assessed based on their understanding of the instruction.

The CATCH Fentanyl Facts lesson supports the requirements of <u>House Bill 3924</u> in the following ways.
